DA Initiates NASAP Plans For 1995

Adlerian approaches to individual, couple and family therapy are all explored. The Institute's session in Tampa last July was not only a financial success but a training success as well. Most participants were new to Adlerian psychology and very excited about what they had learned.

The NASAP <u>Certificate of Study in Adlerian Psychology</u> is now in place. Announcement of the first recipients will occur at the Annual Convention in Minneapolis, May 25-28. Members also receive registration discounts for this excellent training opportunity. This year's theme is <u>Healing Community</u>: An Adlerian Approach -- Connection, Cooperation and Contribution. Watch for information to be mailed next month.

The Adler/Dreikurs Century Fund now totals over \$25,000. We have a goal of \$200,000 for this fund which will be used to further the development of Adlerian psychology. In addition, we have accepted the generous offer the Ansbacher family has extended to begin a fund to sponsor an annual lectureship. Further developments on this project will be announced in future Newsletters.

We are also continuing to work on the Long Range Plan; there is some fine tuning to be done, and then a fairly well orchestrated plan should be

ready for presentation to the general membership at the Convention in May. The Executive Committee will be meeting February 25th; if you have any ideas or concerns to share about the Long Range Plan, or any other issues, please let us know. Your D.A. representatives are also available throughout the year to hear your ideas and deal with your concerns, and both the E.C. and D.A. will be meeting prior to the Convention in May. We're looking forward to hearing from you.

NASAP Now Has 12 Regions!

Close friends decided to do some remodeling on a houseboat in which they have lived happily for 12 years. Adding a window seat and putting on a new roof led to the need to change an entry way which, in it's turn, led to the possiblity of getting rid of an archway that really was too low. And so it went until they were informed by their architect that it would be easier and considerably less expensive to tear down the houseboat and start from scratch. As demolition began, they became acutely aware of the things which they loved about their original houseboat and wished they had never seen the shortcomings which led them to this juncture.

Following two years of deliberation, the Delegate Assembly voted last May to proceed with <u>some</u> reorganization of regions; specifics and implementation procedures deferred to the agenda for the November meeting. The rationale for reorganization has appeared in earlier Newsletter articles and has been discussed at regional meetings. In short, the problem felt so keenly by all regional delegates centers around the difficulty of networking and development in the vast geographic areas which regions now encompass. What follows is intended to both inform members as to the current status of reorganization, (as a result of input by the D.A. and membership at large) and to promote continued involvement of the full membership in these proceedings.

As in the case of the houseboat, any change made in the configuration and number of regions is going to have an adverse affect on some of what is working very nicely in the present structure. The present structure was thoughtfully developed to help the organization run well. And, it has served. The change and implementation plan which the D.A. approved at our November meeting is intended to hold on to as many of the benefits of the current structure as possible while making the revisions which will improve our functioning as a vital organization and which will address, at the same time, some of the goals and tactics outlined in the Long Range Plan.

One element of the present structure which is important to preserve is the strong connection between Canadian members and U.S. members. The proposed "reorganization" is designed to do just that while insuring that Canadian members have solid representation on the D.A. and obviating some of the problems associated with mailings and other financial

transactions across the border with which current delegates now contend. Note in the list of regions in the next column that generally the "new" regions can be thought of more as the "old" regions with some <u>sub-divisions</u> (A and B for each). The idea is that the two delegates from the sub regions work closely for mutual support and overall regional development with time provided in the D.A. meetings for the two delegates to get together to share information and to plan activities in concert. Beyond that, the two delegates will be responsible for developing at least one regional or, better yet, two sub-regional conferences each year. Sub regional conferences could be planned to dovetail both in terms of timing and theme in such a way as to further bring the entire region together.

The proposed sub-divisions are further designed both to distribute membership somewhat more evenly throughout each of the regions and to recognize probable "traffic flow" for affiliation, based on comments and letters received over the past four months.

Changes would happen gradually, depending on the time frame for election of delegates within a certain region. I.E., since my term as delegate expires this year from what is currently Region 1, and since Patti Kyle still has part of her term to finish, the new delegate would be elected from Region 1A so as to insure representation from Canada.

The new redistricting will not completely change the fact that some individuals are better known simply because they live, work and are active in a hub of Adlerian activity and, therefore, have a better chance of being elected when they run for the D.A. than does someone who works, perhaps very effectively and importantly, in an area with few NASAP members, but it does optimize the chance for broader distribution of regional delegates.

Because change is connected to an institution's traditions, change itself is really a part of our way of being. Like every other organization that wants to remain viable into the next century, we're having to change the way we work. We want to continue to hear from members as we move to reorganize in a way that builds on our strengths.

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1994 Membership Report

At the end of 1994, membership totaled 1,125, which is 9.6% less than 1993. Totals by category: 29 affiliate, 693 regular individual, 75 retired, 57 family, 208 student, 26 life and 37 associate.

New - There were 172 new members, 98 of whom were students. The largest number of new members came from Region II--Midwest (62), followed by Region III--South with 33.

Retired - This is the second year for the special retirement rate of \$50. There were 54 members paying that rate in 1993 and 75 in 1994. To be noted, 13 of those 75 donated to NASAP in 1994, which represents 17% of the total donations.

Associate - An Associate Member joins NASAP through an Affiliate and receives the Newsletter and regular member discounts. Thirty-two (32) people became Associate Members when this category began in 1992 and there were 37 members in 1994. They came from 10 Affiliates, the largest number from Puget Sound Adlerian Society (17), followed by Idaho Society of Individual Psychology (8).

<u>Sections</u> - There are now seven Sections and 37.3% of NASAP members belong to sections (406). 1994 totals for each Section: Business and Organization 48, ACT 199, Clinicians 75, Education 76, Family Education 106, Theory and Research 63, Social Equality 69.

Regions - Totals for each: Region I--Northeast 145, Region II--Midwest 314, Region III--South 178, Region IV--Middle Atlantic 123, Region V--Northeast 177, Region VI--Far West 148, 40 from other countries.


Mozdzierz Selected For IP Journal Position

Gerald J. Mozdzierz is the new Editor of the Theory and Research editions of Individual Psychology: Journal of Adlerian Theory, Research and Practice, beginning with the March, 1995 issue. He succeeds Guy J. Manaster who has held that editorship for the past 19 years.

Mozdzierz (pictured right) has been an active member of NASAP for over 20 years, previously served as an Associate Editor for the IP Journal, and Associate Editor for the International Journal of Individual Psychology.

Commenting on his new editorship, he said, "I'd like to continue to build the quality of contributions to Individual Psychology and continue to improve the scholarly aspects of manuscripts published."

A resident of Chicago suburb Western Springs, Mozdzierz's primary position is Assistant Chief of Psychology Service at the Hines V.A. Hospital in Hines, IL. He also is an associate professor of the Department of Psychiatry at Loyola University Stritch School of Medicine and serves as an instructor at the Adler School of Professional Psychology.



Mozdzierz received his Ph.D in Psychology from Loyola University in Chicago and holds a diplomate in clinical psychology from the American Board of Professional Psychologists and a Certificate in Psychotherapy from the Adler School.

Family Council Meetings: A 12-Year Followup A video review by Amy Lew

Rob Guttenberg's videotape on the family council gives us impressive evidence of the strong impact that family meetings can have on children's development. The 20 minute tape begins in 1981 with a segment produced by the 700 Club* to introduce viewers to the concept of Adlerian family meetings. This first half of the tape includes some scenes in a Maryland family education center. It goes on to interview two families who are beginning to hold regular family meetings. There is a lovely scene where a young girl chairs a meeting with her parents. The tape then moves to 1993 with Rob Guttenberg conducting a follow up interview with this now young woman, her parents and younger brother (who doesn't remember a time without meetings). Just listening to the young woman is enough to convince even the most skeptical parent that meetings help to develop the skills and abilities necessary for children to become socially competent, responsible, and thoughtful adults.

While the tape quality is not always the best, the value is, <u>and</u> the price is right -- only \$12 including shipping. The 700 Club has agreed to let Rob distribute the video for educational purposes only, hence the low price. Although NASAP can't make a profit, NASAP members reap the benefit. The video makes a valuable addition to any parenting class or therapist lending library.

I would like to personally thank Rob Guttenberg for pursuing this important project. His social interest is evident in his willingness to devote his time and money to producing this useful contribution. It points to the need for the development of other materials which illustrate the value of our many techniques. Which leads me to suggest that people who find this tape useful, might consider making a contribution to NASAP earmarked for video support of future projects of this nature.
