## NASAP Needs Your Participation

As the season turns to spring, many of us in NASAP think "convention", a time to get together with fellow Adlerians to enhance skills, fulfill continuing education requirements, get inspired and encouraged, "network", socialize, have fun and relax a little. Many of us also find the convention is a time to talk with each other about the past and future of Adlerian psychology and NASAP. During the convention there are both structured and spontaneous opportunities to discuss the burning issues of the day; for those of you who won't be joining us in Minneapolis please give some thought to the present state of NASAP and your ideas for our future.

In speaking with a number of people lately, I have learned that the reasons that lead some people to join NASAP and feel their membership is valuable are the same reasons that lead other people to cancel their membership. It seems that we need to take some time and give some serious thought to our purpose as an organization; this may seem simple and obvious, but I don't think so. A related, and controversial, discussion is concerned with "What is Adlerian psychology?", what are the basic beliefs that define the philosophy? How far can we go "on beyond Adler" and still be operating within a definable structure? If we are able to more clearly define ouselves and our goals, will we be open to criticism about being a "dogmatic cult" (as some have already described us).

#### Organizational Changes Occurring

NASAP seems to be in the midst of some organizational change: some of it is structural, such as the reorganization of the regions, and the development of the Long Range Plan; some of it relates to membership such as the aging of the founding members and the drop-off of attendance at the conventions; some of it is philosophical, such as how can Adlerian psychology respond to the social issues of the 90's.

If you will be attending the convention in Minneapolis in May, please join us during the various opportunities for discussion about the purpose and goals of NASAP. We have specifically structured time for dialogue during the Friday luncheon and, of course, during the region and section meetings.

If you will not be joining us for the convention, let me take this opportunity to say that we will miss you. And I would like to ask you to think about the issues I have mentioned, and encourage you to call or write your delegates, or any member of the Delegate Assembly, and share your

concerns and ideas. (See page three for list of delegates.) To paraphrase one of my favorite quotes, "those who participate decide." I am hopeful that we will have a large number of NASAP members participate in the discussions and decisions that will occur over the next few years, and that the process will be encouraging as well as productive.

# Summer Institute Features Intensive Adlerian Training

Four internationally known Adlerians will provide the instruction for NASAP's Summer Training Institute to be held June 25-30 at the Boca Raton Sheraton Hotel in Boca Raton, Florida. Jim Bitter, Oscar Christensen, Clair Hawes and William Nicoll will combine their teaching talents for the five-day intensive Adlerian training experience which will focus on the topic, Strategies and Techniques of Brief Therapy: Individuals, Couples and Families. CE's and graduate credit is available.

A reduced registration fee of \$395 applies for NASAP members who register before May 15; non-members pay \$425. Fees increase to \$450 and \$475 after that date. The Sheraton is offering participants a special rate of \$49 per room (one to four people) which includes a daily buffet breakfast.

This intensive training is designed for professionals in the mental health field. It will use live counseling demonstrations, supervised skills practice and in-vivo supervision of participants'counseling to develop and refine their brief therapy skills. # Adler School Approved For Hypnosis Program

The Adler School of Professional Psychology announces it has been approved by the American Society of Clinical Hypnosis (ASCH) for its hypnosis program. ASCH is the largest of the two international hypnosis societies recognized by the American psychological and medical associations. It is the only recognized body that provides credentialing of individuals trained in clinical hypnosis, according to Marc Oster, head of Adler's hypnosis program.

The ASCH Accreditation Committee approved Adler to provide the Basic and Intermediate level training at 36 hours for each level. Students seeking ASCH certification at either level can now obtain all their basic and intermediate training through Adler, Oster said.

## Will NASAP Heal Community?
