--Executive Director's Message--

Nine D.A. Positions Available in '97

New Year's Greetings! As I write these comments, tired old 1996 is about to go out the door and the bright new year will be started by the time you receive this. The year 1997 will see a number of changes for NASAP.

New Delegates: Early in the year, there will be Delegate Assembly elections in five regions and four sections with only one delegate eligible and willing to be re-elected, which means almost one-third of the D.A. will be new. Elections will be held in Regions 1B, 2B, 3A, 4A, 5A, ACT, Clinicians, Social Equality, Theory and Research. Letters will be sent in January explaining the election process and describing the responsibilities of delegates. We encourage members to give consideration to the information and to participate in the election process.

The Business and Organization Section held its election early in order to replace their delegates who found it necessary to resign for personal reasons this summer. The two elected are *Daniel G. Eckstein*, whose term expires 1998, and *Edward "Ted" McDorman*, whose term expires in 1999.

New Meeting Planner: A new firm has been engaged to manage NASAP conventions, beginning with the 1997 Annual Convention and Workshops in Vancouver. ARDEL Management is a for-profit corporation headquartered in Minneapolis, specializing in marketing and public relations, society management, and convention and trade show management. David J. Lee, Executive Vice President, is the Meeting Planner who has been working with the local committee and NASAP on the many details connected with the 1997 convention. He is also looking into possible future sites for the next three years. You will be seeing much of his name in 1997.

Retirement: There will be a change of leadership in the central office since I will be retiring sometime after the convention in Vancouver. The date is flexible at this point depending on the outcome of the deliberations on administrative changes being considered by the Long Range Planning Committee and the Delegate Assembly.

<u>Joint Meeting</u>: The Executive Committee will be meeting February 20-22, 1997 and will be joined by some of the members of the Long Range Planning Committee on the 22nd to work on the Long Range Plan proposal so that recommendations will be ready for the annual meeting in May.

New Data Base: A new membership data base system will be installed after the first of the year. We hope that it can be done with a minimum of confusion and without interrupting service to members.


The Question of Trust in Relationships By Lois Ingber, ACT Delegate

The notion of trust is thought about in different ways in different contexts. For instance, there is trust in God, the public trust, and trust in the future. In the first example, there are those whose belief in God allows them to have confidence in the world. The second example speaks of a responsibility toward humanity. The third example describes a hope that things will be different (better) at some future point.

When it comes to relationships, the question of trust becomes more clouded. Consider the example of the parent who says about her teenage son, "I just can't trust him to come home on time." For many parents, this is a justification for denying contact with friends or for applying other types of restrictions, "until he can show me he is trustworthy!" This is usually accompanied by lectures, comparisons to siblings or other expressions of disappointment and punishment. While we can empathize with this parent's desire to have her son demonstrate cooperation, the way she is going about it may be leading to the exact opposite.

When used in relationships, "I can't trust you" becomes a disguised attempt to maintain superiority over another. How can this be? While expecting a child to cooperate and respect order in the home is appropriate, the notion of "trust" introduces into the equation judgment by one person over another as being "morally deficient," i.e., "untrustworthy." The person senses himself placed in an inferior position by the judgement. What occurs then is the classic "double bind." The youth knows he is not cooperating, yet to obey the parent's request (in his private logic) would be to agree to accept being placed in the inferior position and to accept being judged. Both youth and parent feel discouraged by the situation.

A more helpful approach is to first recognize that we cannot control another person's actions. Saying "I can't trust you" places all responsibility for problem solving and change solely on the other person. In a power contest or revenge cycle, a typical dynamic in these situations, the least helpful strategy is concentrating on what the other person should do, because he is more interested in protecting his dignity than hearing the points the other wishes to make. Avoiding the word trust altogether can leave both parties free to then consider (Continued on page six)

Adler "Rediscovered"

Adler was so far ahead of his time that when the current crop of writers and researchers find *truths* that Adler taught 70-90 years ago, it sounds new — especially when Adler isn't mentioned. Current examples include:

Seven Habits of Highly Effective People by Steven Covey

All of Adler's major concepts are found in this book (human dignity, moving from dependence to independence to interdependence, cooperation, mutual respect, assuming responsibility, courage, purpose, family feeling, building relationships, contribution, etc.) Adlerian psychology is alive and well in this book and it's all over the world.

Punished by Rewards by Alfie Kohn

It's clear that Mr. Kohn doesn't like Skinner or any phase of behavior modification. He lists one hundred pages of research that prove that rewards are not motivating; in fact, they teach children to concentrate on self and not others, destroy creativity, ruin relationships, discourage risk-taking, build fear, destroy teamwork, nourish rivalry, teach extrinsic control, and diminish autonomy. He doesn't agree with other Adler/Dreikurs ideas but he's very clear about rewards being disrespectful.

Emotional Intelligence by Daniel Goleman

Goleman emphasizes the importance of self-awareness, self-motivation, empathy and social deftness. He says emotional intelligence is not fixed at birth and can be nurtured and strengthened in all of us. (Is it possible that he has discovered the social embeddedness and *gemeinschaftsgefuhl* that Adler saw as movement towards mental health?)

Born to Rebel by Frank Sulloway

This MIT science historian has *discovered* that the best indicator of future success is birth order. It's being called a "monumental work of scholarship." He describes Adler as Freud's estranged disciple who mentioned birth order but was "vague enough to accommodate almost any real world observation — or its opposite." He distracts with ideas like "congenital shyness" and the effects on birth order. He plans to expand his database, test new predications and publish a revised edition of the book every five years or so.

Adler did say he didn't care if others remembered his name but he hoped they would remember what he said. He didn't, however, give permission to borrow all of his ideas without credit or acknowledgment, or to pretend he never said it.

Perhaps we should invite these *discoverers* to join NASAP or, better yet, how about we give them a one year free membership. What do you think? Do you have other books we should know about or ideas you want to pass along?

Convention Housing for All Pocketbooks

There will be four housing rates on the University of BC campus available for the '97 Convention. A single suite with a private washroom and single bed will cost \$54 Canadian (approximately \$38 U.S.); a double bed suite with bedroom, living room, TV kitchenette, and private washroom, C\$79; a triple suite, with two twin beds in bedroom and queensize murphy bed in living room, plus previously mentioned rooms, C\$92; and single rooms with a shared washroom for C\$30. In the last facility, there are six single bedrooms with one large washroom. These prices do not include an 8% provincial hotel tax and 7% goods and services tax.

Scholarships Available

There are scholarships available from both NASAP and individual Sections. Deadline for all scholarships is March 1.

NASAP offers up to five scholarships to graduate students who have financial need and have previous experience in Adlerian activities. These are in addition to the participants in the Graduate Student Forum. The Adlerian Counseling and Therapy Section offers three scholarships; Family Education offers two; and Business and Organization, Clinicians, and Education also offer scholarships.

what the real issues are and more respectfully and courageously take steps to resolve them. In this example, logical consequences could be applied. The parent is then taking responsibility for what she can do and not feeling helpless, while the youth can feel encouraged by being given responsibility in a respectful way. The process is the same in couple, work, and school relationships, wherever there is a question of *trust*.
