Gerald Corey Chosen As '98 Ansbacher Lecturer

Gerald Corey, prominent author and co-author of 46 books and texts in psychology, will be the keynote speaker for the 1998 NĀSAP Convention in Dallas, Texas, May 21-24. He will give the opening address Thursday night, May 21, as the second Ansbacher Lecturer.

Corey is currently a professor of Human Services and of Counseling at California State University in Fullerton and has distinguished himself as a teacher as well as an author. CSU has granted him awards for his outstanding services as a faculty member on two occasions. His long list of notations also includes Fellow of the Association for Specialists in Group Work; Fellow of the American Psychology Association and recipient of the Ohana Award for contributions in areas of diversity and multicultural counseling from the American Counseling Association.

For Adlerians, however, Gerald Corey is most known for his popular psychology texts currently in use by many schools of psychology throughout the country. Because of his favorable treatment of Adlerian theory in these texts, his name is the most frequently spoken source given by those calling NĀSAP central office wanting to know more about Adlerian psychology.

Some of these texts were co-authored by his wife, Marianne, and some are in their 4th and 5th editions, including: Groups: Process and Practice; Theory and Practice of Counseling and Psychotherapy; Theory and Practice of Group Counseling; and Issues and Ethics in the Helping Professions.

Many NĀSAP Changes Coming for 1998

I have just returned from a very exciting and productive Delegate Assembly (DA) meeting; we continue to move forward in the implementation of the structural changes while maintaining and expanding current activities. Lee Ann Deal's position as Executive Director was ratified, and Neva Hefner began her retirement with a dinner in her honor hosted by the Delegate Assembly (see box below and song lyrics on page three).

We spent our first day together discussing possible revisions of the By-laws to coincide with the newly approved Constitution and to facilitate the new vision for NĀSAP's governance structure. As part of the transition plan between the new and old systems, a nomination committee is being proposed by the current DA; they will be nominating candidates to run for the Board of Directors next summer. We are also considering ways that the General Membership will be able to nominate candidates for these positions. We will continue to work on the By-laws between now and the May meeting, in an effort to ensure that they are clear, simple and effective. We plan to be ready to vote on the By-laws in May and to implement the new system, with the Board of Directors and Council of Representatives in place, in September, 1998. If you are new to NĀSAP, or just confused about all of this and want to understand it better, or want to share your ideas or concerns, please contact your delegate(s) or a member of the Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC); we'd be happy to discuss the anticipated changes with you.

Some other exciting changes include a rejuvenated name and cover design for the journal, The Journal of Individual Psychology, and the selection of Roy M. Kern and William L. Curlette as co-editors of the journal. Neither James Robert Bitter nor Gerald J. Mozdzierz has decided to accept another term as editor, and we thank them for their many personal and professional contributions to the journal.

We have decided to redesign and expand the Newsletter, with more news and articles from Sections, Affiliates and Individual members; we agreed to continue to include the Resource Page

Adler School To Offer 'Program for Professionals'


Randall Thompson, President of the Adler School of Professional Psychology in Chicago, announces the addition of the *Program for Professionals in Individual Psychology* to the continuing education offerings of the School.

The Program, under the independent sponsorship of the former Americas Institute of Adlerian Studies (AIAS), was developed and taught during the course of 17 years throughout the United States. Many hundreds of participants from the professional ranks of human services, education, and management took one or more of the three intensive, 30-hour courses offered in the comprehensive Program, encompassing Adlerian theory, assessment, and practice. Developed under the leadership of Adler School faculty members, Robert L. Powers and Jane Griffith, AIAS courses enlisted the participation of many other Adlerian instructors, as well as significant material support from many benefactors. In 1982, AIAS became the first Adlerian organization to receive the American Psychological Association's "Full Approval" as an Independent Sponsor of continuing education for psychologists. A short time later, AIAS was in the first group of CE sponsors to gain the approval of the National Board of Certified Counselors.

Many initiatives of various kinds have been influenced by Individual Psychology as a consequence of the pioneering work done by AIAS. The most recent and unusual example may be the formation of the new Baiocchi Institute for Senior Executive Management in Chicago. The faculty of this new Institute is made up of individuals who earned the AIAS Certificate of Professional Studies in Individual Psychology, all of whom are associated with one of the most prestigious executive development firms in the United States.

An important asset of the Program for Professionals, now to be incorporated into the Adler School's new CE offerings, lies in the many connections established by AIAS with various Adlerian groups abroad through pilot projects, experimental courses, and visiting lectures in (for example) Ireland, Greece, and South America. Together with one of these collaborators, Centro de Cambio y Crecimiento (Center for Change and Development) in Caracas, Venezuela, plans are now being made to establish the three-course CE Program for Professionals

BOOK OF THE MONTH

Techniques in Adlerian Psychology

This month's book offer, *Techniques in Adlerian Psychology*, is an essential resource for both practitioners and students of Adlerian psychology. Edited by Jon Carlson and Steven Slavik, this 500-page publication is primarily a collection of classic and reprinted papers from the <u>Journal of Individual Psychology</u>, The <u>Individual Psychologist</u> and <u>Individual Psychology</u>, plus several original articles which state the purpose and method for common techniques not previously defined.

Editors Carlson and Slavik highlight in the book's preface the basic Adlerian tenets that are explored in the following articles. These include: all behavior has social meaning; all behavior has a purpose; holism; striving for significance; behavior as a function of one's subjective perceptions; family atmosphere and values; the family constellation; life style; and social interest. "The major principles of this theory can thus be identified separately for the purposes of understanding, but as the reader will see in the articles in this book, they function together as an intimate whole, each carefully being interrelated and integrated with the others."

The articles are grouped under chapter headings which organize the material into subject areas for quick reader reference: I. Introduction; II. General Techniques; III. Individual Adult Counseling and Therapy Techniques (includes subchapters on Early Recollection Analysis; Questioning and Confrontation Techniques; Uses of Stories, Fables, Aphorisms; Acting "As if"; Humor; Psychodrama; Paradox and "Spitting in the Soup"; Hypnosis; Substance Abuse and Miscellaneous); IV. Child Counseling; V. Couple and Family Counseling and Therapy Techniques.

Published by Accelerated Development, the book is being offered by NĀSAP to its members for \$27.95, a 20 percent discount over the retail price. there, with the first of these courses to be offered in Caracas in May, 1998. With the participation of other interested educators from one of Venezuela's premier independent universities, these plans include the long-term goal of establishing the first Institute of Adlerian Studies in Latin America, with complete graduate and post-graduate curricula. This could be the first of many similar, independent, regional, Adlerian schools in various parts of the world, all in association with the Adler School in Chicago.

The three-course Program for Professionals is now scheduled for the following dates in 1998: Understanding Personality Development and Dynamics, spring, April 16-19; Assessing Individual and Group Styles, summer, July 16-19; and Applying Psychological Skills, fall, October 15-18.

Letter To Editor:

Bring Buzz Back: Let Legacies Last!

I received a call from Edna Nash, telling me about details of the last and the next of the NĀSAP Fireside Chats. I believe they can be wonderful soul-makers. When Edna asked me to repeat my contribution to the Chats, I told her that the Vancouver '97 was my swansong for professional meetings. I was adamant in my polite refusal. But Edna, with adroit clinical acumen, said the only words which could possibly net my commitment. The format is to be dialoguing on the legacy you wish to leave. So I agreed.

I did not tell her about the dismal deep discouragement in so-called mental health care here. As the last rural solo psychotherapist, I am about to be downsized, outsourced, and discarded because I am not a member of an urban group which will accept capitation (and do electronic billing). Once health care got on the market, the theme was one nation under greed, in greed we trust. Having been the most visible curbstone Adlerian for a generation (and as much a Mother Teresa as a professional group can tolerate), I am rich, but not affluent, wealthy but dollar-dry. So I have devised a plan to keep me from sleeping in the streets of Dallas.

Jane Griffith was the first to call about the seven early Adlerian books. And so, if you want to borrow them, see Jane and Bob, not me...Now the next issue of books which concerns me: the disposal of the two that I had printed privately for my classes and workshops. *Essential Readings* and *Super-Natural Highs* were printed ...(10,000, I believe) by a former Adlerian, Jane Stavoe, of Mount Prospect, IL. *Essential Readings* has five of my favorite papers, for a sixty page bound booklet. All of the papers are still avant-garde, as much as they were when they appeared in <u>Individual Psychology</u>. One paper is a chapter from a book on humor, published by John Wiley in London, but never in the USA. In fact, the papers seem to be a response to Arthur Freeman's '97 Ansbacher lecture. They all go out to dialogue with other theories, techniques, and new concepts.

It is too late for me to submit NĀSAP '98 proposals for a workshop and paper. So, I'm making this book sale a fund-raising for my presence at Dallas '98. Oh, yes, the *Super-Natural High* book (probably only a couple hundred of those left, whereas ERs number about one thousand), I call the "rubber-band" book because I stopped selling them at meetings when I saw about ten lying about with their spines broken. I then provided a rubber-band with each book I gave, having noted that people who had the book for years kept it together with the rubber band. (The spines, you see, were glued, not sewn)...

The plan is to pay \$5.00 U.S. shipping and handling. Then you order (send to Buzz at 106 Kelley Rd., Bastrop, TX 78602-9761) as many of the books as you want for only two dollars each (which is considerably less than I paid for them)...
